#### LOOKING BACK, STEPPING FORWARD

#### 6. The Etymology of Parshat Devarim

Parshat Devarim is a moment for recapitulation and reflection. We can begin to reflect back on the journey through Torah as well. What has the journey been like for us?

--Have we mostly been aware of our discomforts/objections/criticisms? If so, then maybe it's been mostly a **plague** for us.

# דבוֹרָה

-- Has it been provoking, annoying? If so, then maybe it's been mostly a swarm of bees.

#### דובר

-- Has it been a nurturing environment? If so, then maybe it's been mostly a pasture.

## וְדָר

-- Has it been a dynamic experience? If so, then maybe it's been mostly an event.

#### מִדבַּר

-- Has it been bewildering? If so, then maybe it's been mostly a wilderness.

# ל<u>ְד</u>בֵּר

-- Have I been silent too long? If so, then perhaps it's time to speak.

# טֿוּוֹן

--Does it all seem like pure fantasy that melts away with morning light? Then perhaps it's just a dream (*Chazon*).

# תִּשְׁעָה בְּאָב

--Are we primarily aware of the tragedies that we know befall upon the Jewish people over the thousands of years since the Torah was written? Then perhaps we're mostly aware of the unfulfilled/the losses (*Tisha b'Av*).

"If we're aware that the writing is never over, that the next chapters are for us to write, then perhaps we're mostly aware of Torah as a mystery we are not afraid to claim as our own. A mystery the details of which change a bit each time we revisit it to suit our needs of the moment."
